

The Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice (MOCJ) partners with Center for Court Innovation, Los Sures, Jacob Riis to implement the Mayor's Action Plan for Neighborhood Safety (MAP) in 15

NYCHA developments across all 5 boroughs.

365 NYCHA residents joined NSI stakeholder teams called NeighborhoodStat Teams or **NSTAT Teams**.

NSTAT Teams are groups of residents, CBO and City Agencies that **come together regularly to co-produce safety** by setting priorities and executing action plans.

Since 2017, NStat Teams have engaged over **31,100 NYCHA residents** with **20% youth participation** via street outreach, public events, meetings and participatory design sessions for placemaking projects and public safety action plans.

For example in 2018, 6 weeks NStat teams engaged **1,600**NYCHA residents citywide in participatory design events and collected over **6,100 ideas citywide** on how to improve public safety and wellbeing at NYCHA.

City Relationships & Partnerships


- Put forth bold steps to create change and use financial resources to incentivize new approaches.



Creating an Action Agenda

Components of an Effective Action Agenda

- 1. Achievable GOALS to help realize a clear VISION
- 2. Clear **STRATEGIES** to address goals
- 3. **ACTIONS** that need to be taken to meet goals
- 4. People who will be in charge of **LEADING** each action
- 5. TIMEFRAME of when actions will be completed
- 6. **RESOURCES** needed to complete each action
- 7. MILESTONES to evaluate progress
